Evening will begin with traditional Syttende Mai parade around St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in downtown. Bring your flag and wear your bunad.

Fred Plotkin, of the Magazine: *OPERA NEWS*; May 1997 wrote "Scandinavian food [is] cool and elegant, pleasing to eye, ear (the crunch of flatbread), nose and mouth. Scandinavian food is all about the discovery of primary flavors, about the appreciation of freshness, and about that special sort of simplicity found in things of the highest quality. Every ingredient is at its peak, and rather than being blended and cooked down, they appear in their naked beauty. The crazy American fad for fusion (the blurring of styles, so that you have Mexican ingredients cooked with Asian spices, finished in French wine and smothered in herbs) would never happen in Scandinavia, where the goal is to taste everything on its own, even if you taste many things at once. This, of course, is the world-renowned smorgasbord."

"I am told that the typical Scandinavian makes five trips to the smorgasbord. With each round, he picks up a small plate and assembles foods with compatible flavors, textures and fragrances. Usually one begins with a plate of herring, which may be poached, pickled, marinated, smoked or spiced, dressed with sauces such as cream, mustard or tomato. Then one returns for a plate of small seafood and smoked fish, then perhaps a plate of vegetables or salads, then a plate of either sliced meat or cooked fish. Finally, there may be a small plate of pastries. Separating all these foods into groups makes them infinitely more appealing than if they were heaped together on one enormous plate."

## Smithsonian Exhibition on Vikings

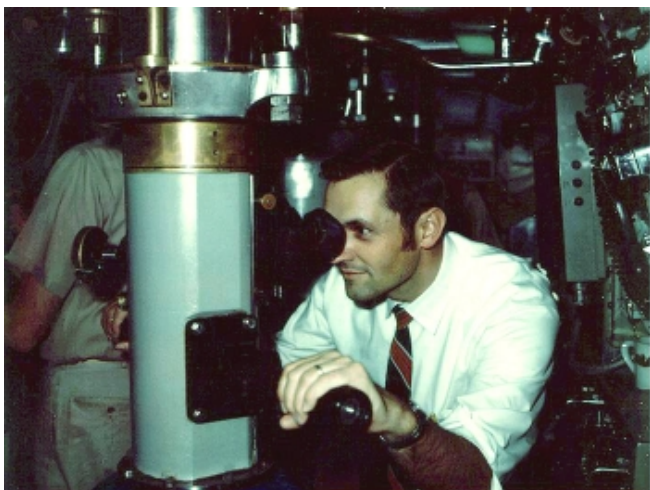

## **New NFCA Scholarships**

National Fraternal Congress of America (NFCA) has recently established a Youth Volunteer Scholarship Program to demonstrate its dedication to supporting higher education, encouraging youth volunteerism, and promoting the fraternal benefit system. The Youth Volunteer Scholarship Program first and foremost recognizes a demonstrated commitment to performing volunteer service to the community at an exemplary level. Award winners are also expected to have established a solid academic performance during high school as a foundation for a successful college experience.

Six Volunteer Scholars will be awarded up to \$7,000 each and eight Honorable Mention recipients will be awarded up to \$1,000 each. Scholarship payments cover actual costs for tuition, books, and fees for the freshman year.

### **Internet Lessons for 55 Years and Older**

Centers for the elderly, libraries, committees, and volunteer centers all over the country of Norway invited adults over the age of 55 to attend an Internet course free of charge on October 17, 2000. The organization Semornett Norge was responsible for the invitation. Coffee and treats were to be served in over 350 locations, where the organization held lectures and demonstrated the use of the Internet for seniors. The organization expected 15,000 people to take advantage of this offer. Lectures were to be held on how helpful the Internet can be in areas of interest, such as genealogy, local history, banking and traveling. Seniornett Norge is said to be an ideal organization that was established in October of 1997 by a group of seniors teaching other seniors how to access and use the service at an Internet Cafe in Oslo.

*From the Kitchen*

**Eplekake fra Jølster**

A delicious dessert cake that should be served in the pan.

- 2 lbs. apples
- 4 oz. raisins
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- Grated peel of one lemon
- 2 tbsp. sugar
- 2 tbsp. water



- Cake Batter:*
- 1/4 cup butter (or margarine)
  - 3/8 cup sugar
  - 3 eggs
  - 3/4 cup ground almonds
  - 1 tbsp. flour

Core and peel the apples. Slice them. Place apple slices, raisins, grated lemon peel, cinnamon, sugar, and water in a wide-topped saucepan. If the apples are tart, add a little more sugar. Cook uncovered until the apples are soft. Shake the pan now and then. Cool. Stir butter (or margarine) lightly with half of the sugar. Separate the eggs. Add the egg yolks, flour and ground almonds to the butter and sugar. Beat the egg whites with the rest of the sugar and fold them carefully into the batter.

Grease an ovenproof dish or a cake tin, about 9 inches in diameter. Put half of the batter in the dish and bake on the middle rack of the oven at 350° F (180° C for 10- 15 minutes, until golden. Lay the cooled apple slices, raisins, and nuts on the baked cake bottom and cover with the rest of the batter. It will not cover the fruit, but spread it out as well as possible. The surface will expand during baking.

Bake the cake for a another 15-20 minutes.

Serve lukewarm with whipped cream.

**Digger Called fom the Grave**

Grave-digger Torbjørn Hestmo nearly dug his own grave, reports a daily newspaper in Norway. A fresh grave caved in over Hestmo, covering his legs with holy dirt, and inhibiting his movement. Simultaneously, a wooden board fell down and hit him in the head, eventually causing him to lose consciousness. Before blanking out, however, he managed to call for help by using his handy cellular telephone. "I do admit, it was rather eerie to lay buried with the dead," Hestmo expressed to a local newspaper in southern Trøndelag.

## Bancroft, Arnesen Expedition

A first all-female crossing of Antarctica started in November 2000 and is scheduled to be completed in February of 2001. The two women, Liv Arnesen from Norway and Ann Bancroft from Minnesota, are skiing unsupported, pulling 250-pound sleds by ski and sail 2,400 miles from sea level to 11,000 feet in 100 days. Bancroft and Arneson, born half of a world apart, became infatuated with Antarctica at the same age (12) and by the same book (about Sir Ernest Shackleton's tortuous try to reach the South Pole in 1914). "Ann and I have dreamed all our lives of the pole and the Antarctic," Arneson said. "Kids all have a dream. They have to find their own South Pole. The message is that everything is possible."
